The Artistic Reflection Framework on Dali's Tarot cards: The Mystical Secret Uncovered? By Bruno Hoste

Disclaimer: This document has been generated with the help of AI (CoPilot and ChatGPT). The Artistic Reflection Framework (ARF) is a conceptual thinking framework I developed. I used the content of Dali's Tarot card deck booklet to discover how Dali designed his cards and how he looked at each card specifically, translating each of the Tarot's card properties into visual artistic outcomes. AI allowed me to search for similarities between the conceptual framework (as a guidance tool for human psyche) and the Tarot's card philosophy.

Introduction

I'm a huge fan of Salvador Dali. A lot of people are too, but they have probably never read his books or tried to discover his thinking perspectives on creation (I did). He believed that true art comes from deep within the unconscious mind. Inspired by Freud's ideas, he used dreams, irrational thoughts, and spontaneous imagination to fuel his creativity. Dalí developed a technique called the "paranoiac-critical method," which helped him tap into hidden fears and surreal visions. He saw art not as something logical or perfect, but as a way to explore madness, obsession, and the strange beauty of the human psyche. Surrealism, for him, was a tool to break free from rules and expectations—it allowed him to paint melting clocks, floating objects, and dreamlike landscapes that challenged reality. Dalí didn't aim for perfection; instead, he embraced spontaneity and intuition, believing that imagination mattered more than technical skill. His creative process was intense and ritualistic, often involving long hours of staring at a canvas until an image revealed itself. He once said, "The only difference between me and a madman is that I am not mad," showing how closely he walked the line between genius and insanity. Dalí's reflections on art remind us that creativity isn't always neat or rational—it's often wild, mysterious, and deeply personal. His work invites us to look beyond the surface and explore the strange worlds within ourselves.

Salvador Dalí's was always open to try something new, especially if it was something of mystical nature. In 1984 he published his own Tarot card deck. Originally commissioned for the James Bond film Live and Let Die, Dalí continued the project independently for over a decade, finally creating a full 78-card deck. Each card is infused with his signature dreamlike style, merging classical art references with symbolic depth. Dalí portrayed himself as the Magician and his wife Gala as the Empress, reflecting their personal connection to the mystical themes. The deck is not only a tool for divination but a visual journey through Dalí's imagination, rich with colour, symbolism, and eccentric beauty.

I recently won an auction lot "Dali's Tarot Cards", a specific numbered edition box published by Fiebig (Krummwish, Königsfurt Germany 2004). I was very interested his artwork design for this endeavour, it was certainly not my intention to go into the mystics of tarot, but in the end I had to read about the tarot cards in order to understand each of the cards and how Dali was inspired by them and how eventually he sculptured his reflection on them.

I'm a scientist and artist, and not really into mystical things like tarot ... but when reading through it I somehow got triggered by the fact that my 'Artistic Reflection Framework' (ARF) might somehow match the Tarot cards. There seemed to be some kind of coincidental link, content wise. So I went into it deep (very deep, maybe too deep () using AI analytics allowing 'easy' integration and comparison, this is what I discovered...

See it as a creative journey (if your open and up for it), nothing more, nothing less ...

What is a Tarot Card deck?

A traditional Tarot deck consists of 78 cards, divided into two main groups: the Major Arcana and the Minor Arcana. The Major Arcana includes 22 cards, representing major life themes and spiritual lessons—starting with The Fool (0) and ending with The World (21). The Minor Arcana has 56 cards, split into four suits: Wands, Cups, Swords, and Coins. Each suit contains ten numbered cards (Ace to 10) and four Court Cards: Page, Knight, Queen, and King. Together, the deck reflects both everyday experiences and deeper archetypal journeys.

For content on the Artistic Reflection Framework, see: https://www.dekunstproeverij.be/en/blog/. Each quadrant reflects a distinct moment in thinking area through a combination of:

- Primitive: Instinctual, Embodied, Raw experience
- Emotional: Relational, Intuitive, Affective processing
- Rational: Analytical, Reflective, Integrative thought

and

- Open: Inception, Receptivity, Exploration
- Change: Action, Processing, Transformation
- Close: Resolution, Grounding, Integration

If we summarize each Major Arcana card mentioned in the Dali Tarot book in five words, this is what comes out:

- The Magician: Creativity, uniqueness, transformation, talent, individuality
- The High Priestess: Intuition, mystery, duality, inner-guidance
- The Empress: Fertility, beauty, abundance, nurture, femininity
- The Emperor: Authority, structure, protection, order, stability
- The Lovers: Choice, passion, unity, values, relationship
- The Chariot: Willpower, victory, motion, control, determination
- **Strength**: Courage, inner power, patience, resilience
- The Hermit: Solitude, introspection, wisdom, guidance, retreat
- Wheel of Fortune: Change, destiny, cycles, chance, evolution
- Justice: Balance, fairness, truth, decision, responsibility
- The Hanged Man: Surrender, new perspective, sacrifice, pause
- **Death**: Transformation, endings, renewal, release, rebirth
- **Temperance**: Harmony, moderation, blending, peace, integration
- The Devil: Obsession, temptation, materialism, control, shadow
- The Tower: Upheaval, sudden change, awakening, destruction
- The Star: Hope, healing, inspiration, serenity, vision
- **The Moon**: Illusion, emotion, subconscious, mystery, dreams
- The Sun: Joy, clarity, success, energy, enlightenment
- Judgment: Awakening, reflection, redemption, inner calling
- **The World**: Completion, fulfilment, wholeness, travel, celebration
- The Fool: Beginning, innocence, spontaneity, freedom, journey

Minor Arcana cards summarized in a five-words for each suit and rank from the Dali Tarot:

Wands (Fire - Action and Will)

- Ace: Spark, initiative, drive, birth, breakthrough
- **Two**: Decision, planning, vision, choice, crossroads
- Three: Progress, foresight, exploration, momentum, confidence

- Four: Celebration, harmony, foundation, joy, stability
- **Five**: Conflict, struggle, rivalry, challenge, competition
- Six: Victory, recognition, success, achievement, pride
- **Seven**: Defence, courage, resilience, standing-firm, determination
- Eight: Speed, momentum, direction, quickness, movement
- **Nine**: Persistence, strength, fatigue, endurance, protection
- Ten: Burden, responsibility, stress, effort, pressure
- Page: Curiosity, enthusiasm, energy, message, impulse
- **Knight**: Passion, adventure, charisma, initiative, boldness
- Queen: Creativity, leadership, confidence, vitality, vision
- King: Power, action, inspiration, command, influence

Cups (Water - Emotions and Relationships)

- Ace: Love, new feelings, intuition, purity, start
- Two: Union, connection, affection, trust, mutuality
- Three: Friendship, celebration, community, support, laughter
- Four: Apathy, contemplation, boredom, reassessment, dissatisfaction
- **Five**: Loss, grief, sorrow, regret, emotional-challenge
- Six: Nostalgia, memories, innocence, comfort, past
- **Seven**: Choices, illusions, imagination, fantasy, temptation
- **Eight**: Withdrawal, letting-go, search, transition, disillusionment
- Nine: Satisfaction, contentment, indulgence, wish, fulfilment
- **Ten**: Happiness, family, harmony, peace, love
- Page: Sensitivity, emotional-growth, message, romance, learning
- Knight: Charm, idealism, devotion, dreaminess, proposal

- Ace: Clarity, truth, breakthrough, focus, idea

- Four: Rest, recovery, retreat, pause, healing
- Five: Defeat, conflict, ego, betrayal, tension
- **Six**: Transition, healing, escape, journey, progress
- **Seven**: Deception, strategy, secrecy, avoidance, cleverness
- Eight: Restriction, fear, helplessness, entrapment, limitation
- Nine: Anxiety, worry, despair, insomnia, inner-fear
- **Ten**: Collapse, ending, betrayal, crisis, devastation
- Page: Curiosity, vigilance, truth-seeking, observation, alertness
- Knight: Intensity, boldness, haste, determination, rush
- Queen: Clarity, intellect, independence, perception, directness
- King: Authority, logic, wisdom, fairness, analysis

Coins (Earth - Material World and Security)

- Ace: Opportunity, prosperity, potential, abundance, foundation
- **Two**: Balance, adaptability, juggling, flexibility, choices
- Three: Collaboration, skill, teamwork, growth, effort
- Four: Control, security, possessiveness, stability, greed
- Five: Hardship, loss, insecurity, struggle, lack
- **Six**: Generosity, support, balance, charity, fairness

- Seven: Patience, assessment, delay, investment, effort
- **Eight**: Diligence, mastery, learning, dedication, productivity
- Nine: Luxury, self-sufficiency, accomplishment, beauty, independence
- **Ten**: Wealth, legacy, family, success, tradition
- Page: Ambition, study, opportunity, focus, youth
- Knight: Responsibility, dedication, routine, perseverance, reliability
- Queen: Nurturing, comfort, wealth, fertility, sensuality
- King: Success, abundance, leadership, groundedness, control

Is there a relation to the 'PRIMITIVE-EMOTIONAL-RATIONAL' brain thinking levels?

Looking at the outcomes of the cards above, there seems to be some kind of link with the brain thinking levels of my refection framework. Thus, which Tarot cards might somehow fall under the 'primitive thinking', 'emotional thinking' and 'rational thinking'? If we loosely align the Tarot cards—especially as Dali's deck interprets them—with the brain's three evolutionary layers (primitive, emotional, rational), here's a symbolic mapping that reflects instinct, emotion, and cognition:

Primitive Brain (Survival, Instincts, Impulses)

- The Devil primal urges, addiction, fear
- The Tower sudden shock, destruction
- Strength inner animal power, instinctual taming
- Death transformation, biological inevitability
- The Fool unconditioned spontaneity, instinctive leap
- The Empress nurturing, sensuality, emotional comfort
- **Five of Wands** raw conflict, competition
- Knight of Wands impulsive action, fiery survival drive
- Knight of Swords focused mental clarity

Emotional Brain (Feelings, Memories, Connection)

- The Lovers relationships, value bonding
- **The Moon** fears, illusions, the subconscious
- The High Priestess intuition, inner wisdom
- Temperance balance of emotions
- All Cups cards especially Ace, Two, and Ten
- Six of Cups nostalgia and emotional memory
- Queen of Cups empathy, maturity in feelings

Rational Brain (Thought, Logic, Awareness)

- Justice ethics, fairness, objective reasoning
- The Magician intellect, communication, mastery
- The Hermit introspection, solitary analysis
- The World synthesis and integration
- The Chariot controlled direction, willpower
- Almost all Swords cards especially Ace, King, and Queen
- Page of Swords alertness, nervous tension
- **King of Coins** grounded logic in materiality

Of course, many cards blend these domains—like The Star, which fuses hope (emotional) with vision

(cognitive), or **The Hanged Man**, which can represent surrender (emotional) and perspective shift (rational).

The other remaining Major Arcana that weren't yet placed and intuitively assign them to brain areas, based on their symbolic themes, imagery, and psychological resonance—especially as interpreted in Dali's surrealist style.

Primitive Brain (Instincts, Fear, Survival, Raw Urges)

- The Wheel of Fortune Linked to fate and unpredictability, which trigger primal fear or hope
- Page of Wands Embodies bold, unfiltered, childlike impulse and wonder
- Eight of Coins Mastery through diligent, goal-oriented work (link with rational thinking)

Emotional Brain (Love, Intuition, Empathy, Memory)

- The Star Faith and spiritual renewal that emotionally uplift
- The Sun Childlike joy, clarity, and warmth—pure affective positivity
- Judgment Emotional reckoning, forgiveness, awakening at a soul level
- Six of Coins Giving and receiving, tied to emotional reciprocity
- Five of Cups Mourning and despair that stem from visceral loss
- Nine of Cups Deep satisfaction and heartfelt wishes fulfilled
- **Knight of Cups** While romantic, his dreaminess leans into instinctual fantasy and emotional seduction
- Queen of Wands Charismatic warmth, relational influence rooted in self-confidence

Rational Brain (Analysis, Awareness, Mastery, Intellect)

- The Hierophant Structured belief systems, tradition, and social reasoning
- The Hanged Man Symbolizes surrender and stillness before transformation, a nervous system response
- The World Integration and completion—clear mental understanding of cycles
- Ten of Swords Signals overwhelm and collapse, evocative of crisis-mode reactivity
- King of Swords Sharp intellect, moral clarity, and strategic thought
- **King of Wands** Visionary leadership and purposeful direction
- Queen of Coins Practical wisdom, emotional intelligence grounded in physical reality

Of course, many cards contain elements of multiple brain realms. Dali's Tarot, rich in surrealism and contradiction, blurs boundaries as much as it maps them.

Are there links between brain thinking levels and Minor Arcana cards?

Each suit is mapped to the brain's evolutionary triad—primitive, emotional, and rational—based on their elemental symbolism and function, especially through the surrealist and psychological lens of the Dali Tarot:

Primitive Brain (Instinct, Survival, Impulses) → Wands

- Element: Fire
- **Keywords**: Action, willpower, instinct, assertion, competition
- **Why**: Wands are all about primal drive—our urges to initiate, conquer, defend, and explore. The fight-or-flight system pulses strongest here. Dali portrays this suit as bursting with energetic tension, raw ambition, and self-assertion—pure *id*, if you will.

Emotional Brain (Feeling, Memory, Empathy) → Cups

- Element: Water
- **Keywords**: Emotion, relationships, intuition, moods, memories
- Why: Cups embody the heart's terrain. Joy, sorrow, longing, connection—these arise from our limbic system. In the Dali Tarot, this suit often hints at soulful entanglements, nostalgia, and yearning, capturing the murky depths of the subconscious and emotional vulnerability.

Rational Brain (Logic, Awareness, Conscious Thought) → Swords

- Element: Air
- **Keywords**: Thought, communication, conflict, intellect, discernment
- Why: Swords represent the cerebral world—perception, ideas, critical thinking, ethical
 dilemmas. Whether sharp in truth or double-edged in conflict, this suit thrives in the prefrontal
 cortex. Dali's Swords often dissect complexity and cast light on illusions with surgical clarity.

Integrative Brain (Grounding, Mastery, Adaptation) → Coins

- **Element**: Earth
- **Keywords**: Body, materiality, health, work, manifestation
- **Why**: While not a "brain" area per se, Coins bridge the psychic and the physical. This suit embodies how instincts (Wands), emotions (Cups), and thoughts (Swords) manifest in the real world. The earthy domain is the body's wisdom—rhythm, survival, grounded judgment.

Each suit reflects a part of our internal architecture, but Dali's genius was in showing their surreal intersections: how a Cup might leak into a Sword, or how a Coin may be pierced by a Wand.

Is there a relation to the 'OPEN-CHANGE-CLOSE' process levels of the reflection framework?

In a next step the tarot cards were positioned when looking at the phases in brain processes (of the 'artistic reflection framework') and where are they best positioned, in which phase. It is an effort in trying to align the triune brain model and Tarot symbolism with the cyclical structure of the ARF: Open \rightarrow Change \rightarrow Close. An holistic map below explores how different cards resonate with each phase of creative cognition and transformation.

OPEN (Inception / Receptivity / Exploration)

Brain Phase: Activation of emotional and primitive instincts; openness to stimuli and subconscious materials

Tarot Cards:

- The Fool pure openness, trust, beginner's mind
- The High Priestess intuitive depth, inner voice awakens
- The Star inspiration, cosmic hope, imaginative spaciousness
- Page of Cups / Page of Wands innocent curiosity, initial sparks
- Ace cards (especially Cups & Wands) seeds of potential and energetic ignition
- Knight of Wands effort, discipline

Why here? This phase welcomes spontaneity, dreams, unfiltered emotions—qualities these cards embody. The unconscious starts whispering its language.

CHANGE (Action / Processing / Transformation)

Brain Phase: Emotional and rational brains in dynamic interaction; narrative building, creative struggle, integration

Tarot Cards:

- Death shedding, metamorphosis, inner alchemy
- **Temperance** blending, synthesis, emotional regulation
- Justice clarity, ethical evaluation, balanced closure
- Strength managing instincts with grace
- The Chariot willpower and emotional control in motion
- Judgment rebirth, self-assessment, final awakening

Why here? This is the crucible. Emotional courage meets rational alignment. Tarot reflects both the tension and flow between identity, meaning, and the desire for new order.

CLOSE (Resolution / Grounding / Integration)

Brain Phase: Rational and embodied cognition take lead; insight stabilizes, actions are embedded into identity

Tarot Cards:

- The World integration, fulfilment, conscious reflection
- The Hanged Man suspended perspective, letting go
- The Hermit wisdom gained through inner illumination
- King of Swords / Queen of Coins mastery of thought and embodiment
- Ten of Cups / Ten of Coins emotional and material closure
- Eight of Coins effort, discipline

Why here? The insights anchor. What began as fluid or chaotic now becomes crystallized meaning. This is the return from the descent—with gifts.

Now looking at each of the nine individual ARF matrix quadrants, what can we find?

Each quadrant can now be looked individually within this context: Impulse (Open-Primitive), Triggers (Open-Emotional), Amplifiers (Open-Rational), Elementary needs (Change-Primitive), Connection (Change-Emotional), Meaning (Change-Rational), Motivations (Close-Primitive), Persistence (Close-Emotional), and Engagement (Close-Rational).

1. <u>IMPULSE</u>: OPEN-PRIMITIVE – is where wild instinct meets fresh possibility. This is the phase when the subconscious sparks before interpretation, like a fire catching dry leaves. It's impulsive receptivity, pre-verbal yearning, and sensory ignition.

Cards Ideal for OPEN - PRIMITIVE: Instinctual Curiosity, Raw Awakening

- The Fool unfiltered instinct, leap before logic
- Page of Wands childlike eagerness, primal courage
- Ace of Wands first flare of desire, fire of will, new drives awakened, potent ignition
- The Devil temptation awakening from sleep, breaking chains through primal confrontation
- **Knight of Wands** rush of action before awareness, (link change) volatile momentum, transformation through action
- **Eight of Wands** flight, reaction, speed before thought
- **The Empress** sensual, fertile openness to life, (link to emotional abundance, sensory blossoming)

These cards don't think—they *throb*. They represent that very first hum in the belly, the twitch of the hand before the brush meets canvas. No moral, no plan, just motion and instinct rising from the root of being.

2. **TRIGGERS: OPEN–EMOTIONAL** – space where the heart starts to stir, memories surface, and intuitive feeling begins shaping experience. This phase merges *emotional receptivity* with beginnings. Think of it as *feeling your way into a creative impulse* before language or analysis sets in.

Cards Ideal for OPEN – EMOTIONAL: Emotional Awakening, Intuitive Receptivity

- The High Priestess inner voice rising, sacred stillness
- Ace of Cups surge of love, new emotional flow
- Two of Cups initial bond, mutual attraction
- Page of Cups wide-eyed heart, sensitivity emerging
- The Star gentle hope, spiritual openness, emotional hope, but mental openness to cosmic inspiration, clear-headed optimism with visionary quality, calm hope, faith in a renewed future (close)
- **Two of Cups** start of enduring connection, mutual closure (close)
- Six of Cups nostalgia, childhood joy revisited

This phase is like entering a dream or falling in love—**emotion is the guide**, and intuition has the mic. There's a softness here, a willingness to listen to what moves beneath the surface.

3. <u>AMPLIFIERS</u>: OPEN-RATIONAL – suggests a mindset that's *curious but structured, exploratory yet mentally alert*, a fusion of receptivity and cognition. So in the Tarot, we look for cards that symbolize fresh thought, logical awakening, or intellectual receptiveness without the emotional saturation or raw instinct of the other brain layers.

Cards Ideal for OPEN-RATIONAL: Curious Mind Meets Clear Thought

• **The Magician** – Begins the journey with intellectual awareness, communicative spark, and cognitive intent. *Open to potential, yet mentally directed.*

- **Ace of Swords** Birth of mental clarity, truth, and discernment. *The first crack of rational insight entering consciousness*.
- **Page of Swords** Inquisitive, analytical, vigilant. A youthful embodiment of questioning and cognitive alertness.

This phase values clarity without conclusion, questions over certainty, awareness without closure. These cards are *not* processing transformation yet—they're lighting the match and opening the windows of perception.

4. **ELEMENTARY: CHANGE-PRIMITIVE** – captures the wild, visceral intensity of transformation led by instinct and body, rather than emotional reflection or logical reasoning.

Cards Ideal for CHANGE – PRIMITIVE : Instinctual Upheaval, Crisis, Physical Transformation

- **Death** raw biological change, the instinctive end of cycles, link to profound emotional release and regeneration
- The Tower sudden shock, primal reaction to collapse
- Strength taming inner beasts, animal courage during upheaval
- The Wheel of Fortune surrender to fate's motion/roulette disrupting stasis
- **Knight of Swords** Swift, precise, and mentally driven in pursuit of truth. *Embodies the propulsion of the mind at the moment it's activated*
- Five of Wands raw competition, unsocialized drive
- **Ten of Wands** instinctual overload, survival through strain
- Five of Swords power clash, reptilian brain dominance (also rational change)
- Seven of Wands defensive instincts flaring under threat

This phase is all nerve endings and adrenal surge—the kind of shift you don't rationalize until long after it passes. Change here happens to you—or through you—before awareness catches up. Think of shedding a skin, leaping from fire, or choosing to survive.

5. **CONNECTION: CHANGE–EMOTIONAL** — this quadrant represents the terrain of *emotional transformation*: healing, inner conflict, grief, forgiveness, and the tender unravelling and rebirth of the heart. It's where feeling deepens, collides, and reshapes identity.

Cards Ideal for CHANGE – EMOTIONAL: Emotional intensity, personal reckoning, psychic growth

- **The Lovers** choice born from emotional conflict or desire, established commitment, bonded unity (link to close thinking)
- **Temperance** emotional balance, healing through blending, restored emotional balance, peace offering (link to close thinking)
- **Judgment** forgiveness, redemption, soul-deep calling, emotional rebirth, reckoning with grace (link to close thinking)
- The Moon subconscious stirring, dreamlike, dreams begin to whisper
- Five of Cups grief, mourning, emotional reckoning
- **Eight of Cups** leaving behind attachments to grow
- Three of Swords heartbreak, loss that clarifies
- **Knight of Cups** emotional pursuit that deepens through challenge, romantic yearning, imaginative drift

This phase may bring catharsis, heartache, or release—but always in the service of renewal. It's as if the psyche is learning to *feel with more dimension*. Change here is not an argument—it's a *revelation*.

6. MEANING: CHANGE-RATIONAL

This quadrant represents the landscape of cognitive transformation: insight, realization, mental clarity, ethical reckoning, and the restructuring of belief systems. It's where ideas evolve, truths are confronted, and the intellect is refined through challenge and contemplation.

Cards ideal for CHANGE – RATIONAL: Intellectual growth and paradigm shifts, moral and ethical discernment, strategic decision-making, clarity after confusion, mental resilience and recalibration

- **Justice** final decision-making, ethical alignment or reckoning, truth revealed, accountability, rational fairness, anchors decisions in logic and integrity
- **Chariot** determined focus, strategic navigation, mental control over emotional impulses, victory through discipline, integration of opposing forces
- **Two of Swords** mental stalemate, difficult decision, need for clarity, rational tension before resolution
- **Eight of Swords** mental entrapment, limiting beliefs, need for cognitive liberation, confronting illusions to regain clarity
- Queen of Swords objective perception, discernment, mature insight
- 7. MOTIVATION: CLOSE-PRIMITIVE expresses instinctual drive, grounded motivation, and raw determination. This quadrant is all about visceral action, territorial instinct, and survival-based effort—so we're looking for cards that reflect embodied will and protective energy.

Cards Ideal for CLOSE – PRIMITIVE: rooted in the body, driven by need, and focused on tangible outcomes, relentless stamina, holding the line with bruised determination, reflects a raw motivational force that's deeply personal and often protective

- **Knight of Coins** relentless pursuit, physical endurance, territorial loyalty, focused, methodical effort rooted in survival instinct
- **Page of Coins** hunger to learn, resource-driven curiosity, instinct to grow, grounded ambition, tactile exploration of potential
- Four of Wands tribal celebration, territorial pride, instinct to claim space, close-knit bonding, protective joy, rooted in belonging
- **Six of Wands** victory display, ego assertion, primal need for recognition, motivated by status and dominance within the group
- **Nine of Wands** defensive vigilance, survival fatigue, instinct to endure, hyper-focused protection, guarding territory and self
- **Four of Coins** hoarding, possessiveness, fear of loss, territorial control, close thinking driven by scarcity and self-preservation
- **Eight of Coins** gritty repetition, survival through skill, instinct to master, focused labour, tactile learning, grounded motivation

- King of Swords intellectual authority, reasoned clarity
- **Temperance** mindful balance, rational-emotional synthesis
- Eight of Coins methodical learning, mastery realized
- Ace of Swords mental clarity, cutting through ambiguity
- Knight of Swords purposeful mental closure, swift truth
- Six of Swords transition through understanding, mental release

This is *conscious closure*—the point where experience is translated into language or decision. It's a mind at rest, not because it's tired, but because it *knows*.
